Business Corner-Shop Local!

Are you aware of all of the products and services that are available right here in your own neighborhood? How many of our local businesses do you frequent? What drives your decision to shop locally—or not?

Through a Great Streets Business Support Grant from the City of Minneapolis , The Victory Neighborhood Association has created a 'brand' for our businesses on the two commercial nodes at 44th and Penn and 42nd and Thomas and will be promoting those businesses with a mailer three times this year. The purpose is to increase awareness of our local businesses and encourage our residents to patronize them.

In order to gauge the positive impact of these efforts, we are surveying both the local business owners and a random sampling of Northside residents before the mailer goes out to measure the current awareness

level. After the three mailers go out we will resurvey to see if awareness has increased and if there is any increase in patronage.

Many residents comment that they would like to see additional businesses in our neighborhood. If we are to attract more businesses we need to show that we support the ones that we have. Plus shopping locally helps our local economy. Studies show that for every \$100 spent in a locally owned business, \$68 stays in the community (in wages, taxes etc.). That same \$100 spent in a big box store or chain restaurant leaves only \$43 in the community.



Everyone has Riverfront Property

Besides living in the Garden Spot of the city, we can also say that everyone who lives in the Victory Neighborhood truly has riverfront property. We live within blocks of one of the largest and longest rivers in the world; the Mighty Mississippi.

Sometimes those of us who have lived in the area for a long time and even the newcomers tend to take the river for granted . We forget what a beautiful, powerful and important resource the river is and

the responsibility we have to be stewards of the river to ensure that it remains a great resource for generations to come. We very often don't connect (or remember to connect) our actions in our homes, yards and gardens and

with in the community with the river and the impacts they have on it.

Every catch basin in the Victory neighborhood connects to the stormwater sewer system which eventually, one way or another, ends up in the Mississippi . Grass clippings, leaves and other yard waste that are in the street enter the stormwater system and the river where they add nutrients that contribute to algae bloom. That goes for pet

droppings as well. The algae, beside being ugly, sucks the oxygen out of the water that is needed by fish and other aquatic life.

To be good stewards of the Mississippi River , as well as Ryan Lake and Shingle Creek through which some of our stormwater flows, remember the following:

- Keep grass clippings out of the street .
- If you fertilize your lawn do not allow the excess to flow off of hard surfaces into the street.
- Do not rake your leaves into the street—even when the street sweepers are coming the next day!
- Pick up pet waste and dispose of it properly—even in your own yard— to prevent it from washing into the street and down into the stormwater system.
- Keep the catch basins free so that stormwater ONLY can flow freely into the stormwater system.
